- Holy Eucharist on Christmas Eve is at 7pm
- Special worship features in Advent: You will notice a few different things in the Sunday liturgies for Advent. On the first Sunday of Advent, we use the great litany rather than prayers of the people. A form of this litany was the first piece of liturgy written in English (1544) when the Church of England began using the vernacular. We use it to mark the new church year. On the second and third Sundays of Advent, we use the penitential order with the Ten Commandments. The penitential order is a means of preparation for meeting Christ at his return and when we recall his coming in ministry and incarnation. The point is not to make us feel guilty but to remind us that at baptism we promise the Holy Scriptures will be our guide and we will return to the Lord when we stray. Finally, on the fourth Sunday of Advent we use the penitential order with an exhortation to worthy reception of holy communion. The exhortation is meant to be a reminder of the sacredness of the sacrament and the privilege we have in receiving it.

Scripture Lessons: 4AdventC

First Lesson: Micah 5:2-5a

You, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel. whose origin is from of old, from ancient days. Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel. And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the LORD. in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth: and he shall be the one of peace.

The Song of Mary Luke 1:46-55

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord,

my spirit rejoices in God my Savior; *

for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant.

- From this day all generations will call me blessed: * the Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his Name.
- He has mercy on those who fear him * in every generation.

He has shown the strength of his arm, * he has scattered the proud in their conceit.

He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, * and has lifted up the lowly.

He has filled the hungry with good things, * and the rich he has sent away empty.

Second Lesson: Hebrews 10:5-10

When Christ came into the world, he said,

"Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me;

in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure.

Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God' (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."

When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

Gospel Lesson: Luke 1:39-45


In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth.
